

Gardasil is Dangerous and Unproven

Merck's Gardasil vaccine is supposed to prevent young women from getting cervical cancer. Now the FDA has approved a claim for two less common cancers as well. But, whether it will actually prevent any kind of cancer is actually unknown.

Meanwhile, as of July the federal government's Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System has received over 9,700 reports of problems since the vaccine's introduction in 2006. These include paralysis, seizures, and miscarriage. Twenty deaths have been reported, although the government has not acknowledged a link yet.

Vaccines were originally developed to protect the public from extremely contagious diseases spread primarily by air. Now dangerous and unproven vaccines are being mandated in the hope they will guard against diseases that require very intimate contact to transmit.

Merck has launched a powerful ad campaign urging girls to become “one less” victim to cervical cancer. Well, this fear tactic has scared about 18 million U.S. women into getting the Gardasil vaccine since it was approved in 2006. Yet, despite its annual sales of \$1 billion, Gardasil has not become [the blockbuster drug that Merck hoped it would be](#). Fortunately, people are wising up; aside from the moral issue of whether or not the vaccine encourages promiscuity, the long-term effects of the drug are completely unknown, and the immediate side effects are turning out to be very serious – even deadly!

The federal government's Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System has received over 9,700 reports of problems since the vaccine's introduction in 2006. These problems just keep growing and include paralysis, seizures and miscarriage, along with 20 deaths that may be linked to the vaccine! This didn't stop Merck from pushing for an expansion of uses for Gardasil, which the FDA just approved. Gardasil is also being promoted to prevent two rare vaginal and vulvar cancers. At least the FDA made the right choice and decided NOT to approve Gardasil for the prevention of cervical cancer in women aged 27 to 45 (currently it's approved for girls 9 through 26).

If more women knew the reality about the human papillomavirus (HPV), the one that can sometimes lead to cervical cancer, I doubt any of them would voluntarily receive this vaccine. Maybe that's why Merck was pushing so hard to make it mandatory for schoolgirls. So, before you even think about getting this potentially dangerous vaccination, make sure you know what you're risking your health for.

Will the HPV Vaccine Soon be Mandatory for Schoolgirls?

Merck is funding efforts to pass state laws that would require girls as young as 11 to be vaccinated against the sexually transmitted cervical-cancer virus. Some conservative groups argued that this requirement would encourage premarital sex and interfere with parents' rights.

Merck has funneled money to *Women in Government*, an advocacy group made up of female state legislators around the country, and a top official from Merck's vaccine division sits on Women in Government's business council.

At least 18 states are debating whether or not to make Merck's vaccine Gardasil mandatory for schoolgirls. Many of these bills have been introduced by members of Women in Government, claiming that Gardasil protects against strains of the human papillomavirus, or HPV, which are responsible for most cases of cervical cancer.

Merck, maker of the notorious Vioxx, now wants to make their needless human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine Gardasil a requirement for young women. Although Merck openly admits its lobbying ties with Women in Government, the mega-drugmaker will not say how much money they're funneling through the non-profit. Feds Approve Unnecessary Cervical Cancer Vaccine That Will Make Drug Company Billions

Here is what the **FEDs** say: *“All 11 and 12-year-old girls should receive a new vaccine to prevent infection with human papillomavirus (HPV), the most common cause of cervical cancer”* - according to the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

The recommendation is geared to reach girls before they begin sexual activity, as HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the United States. However, the vaccine – Gardasil, made by Merck – is advised for females aged 13-26.



The [Food and Drug Administration](#) approved Gardasil in June 2006. It is licensed for females aged 9-26 and is given in three doses over six months, at a cost of \$120 per dose.

Critics have raised concerns that states might require the HPV vaccine for school admission, a move that would put *“state officials - not parents”* in charge of the sexual health of U.S. children.

One reader of the Vital Notes (Blog), Ronn, from Oklahoma City, OK, reports the following disheartening news: *“It's now a done deal in Texas . . . Bypassing the Legislature altogether, Republican Gov. Rick Perry issued an order making Texas the first state to require that schoolgirls get vaccinated against the sexually transmitted virus that causes cervical cancerPerry has said the cervical cancer vaccine is no different from the one that protects children against polio.*

Merck's HPV Lobbying May be Coming to Your State

Unfortunately, Texas isn't the only state considering making the needless Merck human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine Gardasil a requirement for young teenage women, according to news reports. Merck has been throwing money around the country through [Women in Government](#), a lobbying group targeting female state legislators. The latest goal: Pushing the passage of HPV requirements in at least **18 states**.

The Facts About HPV

There are more than 100 types of human papillomaviruses. Of them, only 10-30 can cause cervical cancer. The rest can lead to skin infections that cause genital warts or common warts on your hands and feet.

Although these are very common viruses, and an estimated 25 million Americans have HPV infections, there's actually little cause for alarm because, as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states, *"In 90 percent of cases, your body's immune system clears the HPV infection naturally within two years."*

This is true whether the infection is the type that can cause warts or cancer. Still, the marketers of Gardasil would have you believe that getting the vaccine will protect girls from the slight risk of cervical cancer that does exist – but this is not the case.

The Gardasil vaccine contains just four types of HPV out of the more than 100 strains. If you contract one of the 96+ types that aren't included, you're out of luck. And, if you have already been exposed to one of the four types of virus in the vaccine, it doesn't work against those either. So, even if you accept the risks and get vaccinated, your chances of getting some form of HPV are still very high. Whether or not the HPV virus will lead to genital warts or cervical cancer, however, depends in large part on the state of your immune system.

Why Risk Your Life to Prevent an Avoidable Disease?

Deadly blood clots, acute respiratory failure, cardiac arrest and "sudden death due to unknown causes" have all

occurred in girls shortly after they have received the Gardasil vaccine. These are obviously atrocious risks to perhaps prevent cervical cancer one day down the road.

Well, according to the CDC more than 6 million women contract HPV annually, yet less than 3,900 women will die from cervical cancer out of those 6 million.






This is because, as I said earlier, your immune system can clear up HPV 90 percent of the time. Drug Company Marketing Leads to HPV Vaccine Rise

Tens of millions of girls and young women have been vaccinated against human papillomavirus (HPV) in the United States and Europe in the two years since two vaccines were given government approval in many countries. One of the vaccines, Merck's Gardasil, has been made available to the poorest girls in the country, up to age 18, at a potential cost to the United States government of more than \$1 billion, and proposals to mandate the vaccine for girls in middle schools have been offered in 24 states.

The lightning-fast transition from newly minted vaccine to must-have injection represents a triumph of what the manufacturers call education – but their critics are calling it a triumph of marketing.

Award-winning advertising has promoted the vaccines, including ads that ran before the film *“Sex and the City,”* on YouTube, and during popular shows like *“Law and Order.”* The vaccine makers have also provided money for activities by patients’ and women’s groups, doctors and medical experts, lobbyists and political organizations interested in the disease, sometimes in ways that skirt disclosure requirements or obscure the companies’ involvement.

Some experts are worrying about the consequences of the rapid rollout of the new vaccines without more medical evidence. Because of the aggressive marketing, even parents of girls who are far from being sexually active may feel pressured into giving them a vaccine that is not yet needed and whose long-term impact is still unclear.

In the United States, hundreds of doctors have been recruited and trained to give talks about Gardasil, at \$4,500 for a lecture. Some have made hundreds of thousands of dollars.

There is no doubt that many well-intentioned parents out there are being deceived , or at the least seriously misled, by Merck, Gardasil’s maker, the media, public health officials, and perhaps their own physicians, into believing that Gardasil is beneficial for their daughters. But, what they do not tell you is that Gardasil has caused thousands of serious reactions, including many sudden deaths within 7 days of inoculation.

Fear Mongering 101: Aggressive Advertising

Aggressive pharmaceutical advertising is nothing new, but the Gardasil anti-cervical cancer campaign has swept across the West like a revolution. It’s also one of the most successful examples of baseless fear mongering I can think of.

While cervical cancer is touted as the second-leading cause of cancer death in women, with 500,000 new cases worldwide each year, the marketing campaign fails to inform you of the entire truth. What they fail to mention is that **nearly 95 percent of those deaths occur in developing countries**, which cannot afford to administer the HPV vaccine anyway.

We already know that where there are Pap smear programs, very few women die of cervical cancer because regular Pap smears can detect precancerous cells early enough for effective treatment. In the U.K., for example, cervical cancer claims a mere 400 lives per year, and in the U.S. it is responsible for about 3,800 deaths yearly – most of which are due to not getting regular Pap smears. Does this truly constitute a public health emergency of such

magnitude that it requires mandatory vaccination of all girls aged 11-26?

And, since the HPV vaccine does not prevent ALL types of HPV, you must continue getting regular Pap smears anyway, or risk ending up with undiagnosed, and, therefore potentially, deadly cervical cancer, which makes you wonder why you really need the vaccine in the first place.

This vaccine campaign is so high on hyped-up fear and so deficient in logic, it boggles the mind. Like Dr. Diane Harper, professor of medicine at Dartmouth Medical School, stated: *“Merck lobbied every opinion leader, women’s group, medical society, politicians, and went directly to the people — **it created a sense of panic that says you have to have this vaccine now.**”*

The Truth is, Your Daughters DO NOT Need this Vaccine!

All they need is a healthy, robust immune system to help clear up HPV on its own, which it does in **90 percent of all cases.**

Is the HPV Vaccine Worth the Risk?

Researchers are finally raising serious questions as to whether the HPV vaccine is really worth the risks involved. An editorial in the latest issue of the [New England Journal of Medicine \(NEJM\)](#) outlines the rising concerns.

First, Gardasil's long-term effectiveness is unclear. And because cervical cancer takes years to develop, critics say the current information is insufficient to determine whether Gardasil works. Then, there's the issue of side effects. FDA records reveal that, since Gardasil's approval, nearly 9,000 girls had adverse side effects after receiving their shots.

If you've been a regular reader of my newsletter, you will have noticed that each time I cover another article on HPV, the body count for adverse side effects from this vaccine has risen by several hundred or more...for example, on June 24th, I reported there were more than 6,700 adverse effects reported. Two months later, almost to the day, the [Association of American Physicians and Surgeons](#) state 8,864 reports have been filed.

Along with NEJM, the organization Judicial Watch has also published a damaging [Special Report](#) about the Gardasil vaccine. Based on records obtained under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), they summarized the approval process, side effects, safety concerns, and marketing practices related to the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine, calling it a “large-scale public health experiment.” One of their most startling findings was the incidence of 78 cases of outbreaks of warts following the vaccination in women already infected without knowing it. In addition to genital warts, some women experienced large outbreaks on their face, hands, or feet.

Additionally, Gardasil was found to have an efficacy rate of -44.6% (that's a minus sign) in women already exposed to the HPV types included in the vaccine!

Judicial Watch also uncovered that Gardasil was tested against an aluminum-containing placebo, rather than a nonreactive saline base, which can make the vaccine appear safer than it actually is – which appears to be the case, if you ask me.

The Insanity Continues

Despite all the risks uncovered and the skyrocketing incident reports of harm, vaccine proponents want to move on

to the next frontier: older women, and young boys???

Absurd Vaccine Marketing – Cervical Cancer Vaccinations for Boys

School-age boys are now being advised to get vaccinated with Gardasil, Merck's cervical cancer vaccine, according to mainstream media reports. Previously, the vaccine was only recommended for girls.

The new male recommendation is based on the notion that boys could get throat cancer if they have oral sex with an HPV-infected girl. According to some, however, recommending Gardasil to boys is little more than a scare campaign aimed at gaining market share from teenage boys.



Even the advice to give mandatory Gardasil vaccinations to young girls is simply disease mongering designed to sell vaccines. This is because girls who have HPV do not automatically get cervical cancer. Girls who have healthy immune systems, and who lead healthy lifestyles, have little risk of developing cervical cancer from HPV. It is only girls who have compromised immune systems that may be vulnerable.

Dr. Raffle, a British cervical cancer specialist said it best: *“Oh, dear. If we give it to boys, then all pretense of scientific worth and cost analysis goes out the window.”*

I believe the mere suggestion already goes to show that this vaccine is nothing more than a cash-cow, offering little proof of any benefits whatsoever, especially considering how easily cervical cancer can be prevented without it.

Virginia Residents – Know Your Rights in 2009!

Although some 24 U.S. states are deliberating mandatory inoculation with Gardasil for school-aged children, Virginia is the only state to pass a bill requiring the vaccine for middle-school entry, which will take effect in 2009. Fortunately, according to a spokeswoman for the governor, the state's vaccination program has included unusually broad freedom to decline the shot. Normally, in order to exempt your child from a vaccine, you'd have to provide a medical reason. But, for Gardasil, no medical reason is required; you only need to sign the appropriate opt-out form.

Be “One Less” To Get Gardasil

There is absolutely no reason to risk the serious side effects of this vaccine to prevent an infection that goes away on its own 90 percent of the time. And there's no guarantee that you'll be protected anyway, since you can still get HPV once you've had the vaccine. It is really a no-win situation for those who receive it. Instead, a better message would be to remind all young girls that they can radically reduce their risk of getting HPV in the first place if they follow safe-sex practices, or wait to have sex until they're in a committed relationship.

Also, remember that keeping your immune system in tip-top shape will help you shake any HPV virus you may have contracted, without the use of drugs.
